About the Hall of Fame

Th e Wisconsin Newspaper Hall of Fame was created in 2001 to honor visionaries and innovators in the Wisconsin newspaper industry. Since then, 54 individuals have been recognized with the honor.

Nominations — accepted annually and approved by a nomination committee — are open to anyone, living or deceased, who has contributed above and beyond the call of duty to newspapers and newspapering in Wisconsin. Th is includes publishers, editors, reporters, photographers or any other newspaper personnel who've had a significant infl uence on the newspaper industry.

The primary criterion is exceptional service on behalf of Wisconsin newspapers. It is expected that nominees should have dedicated at least 15 years of service to newspapering, however, length of service by itself is not a major determinant.

Inductions may be extended to individuals working outside of newspapers, including educators, jurists, attorneys or legislators. Other criteria may be established or considered by the Hall of Fame selection committee or the WNA Foundation Board as deemed appropriate or necessary.





Kent Eymann



Kent Eymann has been a longtime stalwart on behalf of Wisconsin newspapers and a devoted supporter of the industry.

After a stint with a group of community newspapers in his home state of Iowa, Eymann began his Wisconsin newspaper career in 1992 as advertising director for the Beloit Daily News. Two years later, he was promoted to publisher — a role he served in for 25 years before retiring in July 2019.

During his time at the Daily News, Eymann was instrumental in shepherding the newspaper through

tremendous periods of change within the industry. He became a leader and pioneer in the world of digital publishing, and under his leadership, the Daily News was the first daily newspaper in Wisconsin to have a website with live local news updated every day.

Eymann also lent his leadership skills to the statewide newspaper industry. He was an active and devoted member of the Wisconsin Newspaper Association, serving on the WNA Board of Directors from 2006 to 2015. During his term as president in 2013, Evmann spearheaded an effort to engage up-and-comers within the industry through the WNA Future Headliners program. Since his presidency, 15 young journalists have been recognized for their achievements.

Eymann's retirement in 2019 followed a career overflowing with accomplishments as a tireless innovator, courageous leader and a defender of the truth.

Elliott Maraniss



Elliott Maraniss was a crusading investigative journalist, a fierce defender of the First Amendment, and a mentor to generations of young journalists.

He joined The Capital Times in 1957 after one of his columns caught the eye of William T. Evjue, the newspaper's founder and editor. Just weeks after joining the paper, he exposed paper mill pollution in the Wisconsin and Fox rivers, which spurred legislation that continues to have a lasting environmental impact more than 60 years later.

In 1978, after working as the paper's city editor and executive editor, Maraniss became the third editor-in-chief in The Capital Times' history.

A trailblazer in the field, he also made The Capital Times one of the first newspapers in Wisconsin to diversify its news staff. He hired the paper's first black reporter and filled several reporting positions with women in an effort to make the staff more reflective of the community it covered.

As an editor, Maraniss served as a strong mentor for young reporters. He taught them to stand up for the First Amendment, instilling the

importance of exposing wrongdoing.

Maraniss' fearless questioning of authority and relentless pursuit of the truth made him one of Wisconsin's finest journalists.

Susan Shemanske



At a time when women sports reporters were practically unheard of, **Susan Shemanske** was a pioneer in the field.

After graduating from UW-Parkside in 1977, Shemanske joined The journal Times in Racine as a sports writer and copy editor. She eventually moved up to assistant sports editor and, in 1990, was named to lead the department.

Among the first women in the state to hold the title of sports editor, Shemanske excelled in the role. She guided The Journal Times sports staff for more than 27 years, producing a sports section that

consistently ranked among the state's best.

Under her leadership, The Journal Times won numerous statewide newspaper awards, including first place honors for "Best Sports Pages" in 1998, 2004, 2006, 2015 and 2016.

Shemanske constantly impressed her colleagues — not only with her leadership skills, but also with her thoroughly professional approach as a reporter. While covering the Milwaukee Brewers for many years, she always did her homework and earned the respect of players and coaches — not only from the home team, but also visitors.

With an uncanny knack for connecting with people, Shemanske developed a close rapport with those she covered and those who worked for her. She was known as a tough leader and, simultaneously, a close friend by all who knew her.
