News-Review picked second-best paper in national judging

Photos, editorials also get honors

The Vilas County News-Review has won six awards in the National Newspaper Association's (NNA) 2018 Better Newspaper Contest and Better Newspaper Advertising Contest, including a second-place General Excellence award.

The awards were presented to the winners at the NNA's 132nd annual Convention & Trade Show at Norfolk Waterside Marriott in Norfolk, Va., last week.

The News-Review also won two second-place awards for Best Local News Coverage and Best Use of Photographs; a third-place award for Best Single Ad Idea, Black and White; and two honorable mention awards for Best Editorial Pages and Best Photo Essay.

The General Excellence award came in the nondaily division for newspapers with a circulation of 6,000 to 9,999. The News-Review, which also publishes The Three Lakes News, previously won NNA General Excellence awards in 2013 with an honorable mention and in 2001 with a second place.

Earlier this year, the News-Review was presented a Wisconsin Newspaper Association (WNA) first-place

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General Excellence award and received the 2017 Best of Division award from the WNA for

large weeklies. Judging for the NNA contest was performed primarily by active community newspa editors and publishers, as well as retired university jour nalism professors and retired or former newspaper professionals.

On the News-Review's sec ond-place General Excellence entry, the judges commented:
"Outstanding photography
and reproduction. Headlines are smart and inviting. Edito-rial page, as evidenced by letters and local opinion, reflects an active and engaged citi-zenry as well as an active newspaper. Strong features. Nothing negative about this newspaper at all. If I had to nitpick, the leads of news stories could use a little imagination at times. But not anything bad at all."

The Taos News in Taos N.M., was judged first with 92 total points. The News-Review was second with 89 points and The Suffolk Times in Matti-tuck, N.Y., placed third with 82 points.

The News-Review was the only newspaper in Wisconsin, weekly or daily, to win an NNA General Excellence award.

said winning on the national level validates the paper's numerous recognitions on state level

When a panel of judges of peers meet and look to news paper packages from around the country, and in the end they think the News-Review is one of the two best, that's quite an accomplishment," said Krueger.

Editor Gary Ridderbusch said the newspaper's entire staff takes pride in its work, producing a complete package in a team effort.
"That the News-Review ac-

complished this feat with one of the smallest editorial staffs among the competition says something for the excellence of our staff members," said Ridderbusch. "In addition, have an excellent production department, a professional sales staff and freelance writers and correspondents who keep readers informed about our communities

The News-Review staff reved two second-place ceived awards from the NNA. The first one was for Best

Local News Coverage in a combined daily and nondaily division for newspapers with a circulation of 6,000 or more. Entries were judged on the overall depth of local news cov-

The judges wrote: "The News-Review is yet another classic local outlet that focuses on what matters most for local readers, with strong and wellrounded, in-depth reporting and great blend of news, great sports, excellent photos and graphics. Not to mention, again, strong writing, good headline use and editorial con tent. It's my honor to award them second place."

The other second-place award was for Best Use of Photographs in an open daily and nondaily division. Entries were judged on best use of local pho tos, reader interest in illustration and relevancy to news

stories The judges wrote: "Loved the variety of top-quality photos in these issues. I would have liked to see Jennifer West's and Kailyn Hogenmiller's feature photos in color. Nice wildlife shots too."

The News-Review received third-place award for Best Single Ad Idea, Black and White in the nondaily division for newspapers with a circula-tion of more than 5,000. The ad featured Gateway Lodge and was designed by Assistant Production Manager Betsy Boul-den and Advertising Consultant Jo Daniel

ant Jo Daniel.

The judges said: "Creative effective use of art. The ribbon as wine works well."

The News-Review also cap-

tured two honorable mention awards One honorable mention was for Best Editorial Pages in the

daily and nondaily divisions for newspapers with a circula-tion of 6,000 or more. Entries were judged on the content of the editorials and other articles on the page, appearance, readability, variety and gen-eral appeal to reader interest.

The judges wrote: "These pages have a great sense of place. Intensely local content, clear viewpoints expressed simply and well. Excellent work in a very competitive cat-

egory."
The second honorable mention was for Best Photo Essay in the daily and non-daily division for newspapers with a circulation of 6,000 to 12,000. The front page wildlife photo essay by Krueger was titled "Spring Show."

The judges wrote: "Beautiful wildlife photography which isn't that easy to do."

Ridderbusch said producing a quality large weekly newspa per wouldn't be possible with-out the assistance of freelance writers, including news correspondent Ken Anderson, who provides coverage of the Eagle River City Council, Northland Pines School Board and Vilas County Board. The newspaper also has community corresponalso has community correspon-dents, including Nancy DeY-oung in Three Lakes, Wally Geist in St. Germain, Sharon Gifford in Phelps and Bob Hughes in Land O' Lakes.

There were 1,405 entries in the Better Newspaper Contest and 202 entries in the Better Newspaper Advertising Contest for a total of 1,607 entries. A total of 478 awards were won by 115 member newspa-pers in 38 states.
