2018 Collegiate Better Newspaper Contest

The 2018 WNA Foundation Collegiate Better Newspaper Contest was judged by members of the Washington Newspaper Publishers Association. The contest received 283 submissions in 20 categories from 11 student publications in Wisconsin. Eligible entries were published between Sept. 1, 2017 and Dec. 31, 2018.

Group A is comprised of newspapers that publish either weekly or daily. Group B is comprised of newspapers that publish month-

ly or bi-monthly OR at campuses with undergraduate enrollment of 7,499 or less. Categories with three or fewer entries were merged into the next highest circulation group.

All active student publications in Wisconsin were eligible to participate. Students received their awards March 8, 2019, at the WNA Convention & Trade Show Student Honors Luncheon at The Madison Concourse Hotel in Madison, Wis.

General Excellence Group A/B

First Place: *The Clarion -* **Judge's comments:** Brilliantly developed, writing is integrated and enhanced in layout, very attractive features.

Second Place: *Marquette Tribune* - **Judge's Comments:** Very clean design and top quality writing.

Third Place: Advance-Titan - Judge's Comments: First-rate news coverage, ace writers in a well-balanced traditional newspaper format.

Collegiate Journalist of the Year Group A/B

First Place: *Marquette Tribune -* Morgan Hughes.

Second Place: *MediaMilwaukee* - Talis Shelbourne.

Third Place: *The Badger Herald* - Matt O'Connor.

Honorable Mention: *The Clarion -* Jessica Deegan.

Breaking News Reporting Group A/B

First Place: Marquette Tribune, "Wisconsin Supreme Court rules in McAdams' favor" - Morgan Hughes. Judge's Comments: Followed the story from the beginning to its conclusion. Reporting was concise and covered all bases, while coming out ahead of national news agencies.

Second Place: The Daily Cardinal, "Chemistry TA relieved from teaching duties amid allegations of white supremacy" - Noah Habenstreit. **Judge's Comments:** Well-reported piece. Clarified all aspects of the story to the reader.

Third Place: College Days, "Controversial meeting of YAF and administrators" - Connor Renshaw. Judge's Comments: Well-reported piece, provides clear timeline of events and details the entire story.

Honorable Mention: The Clarion, "Immigration policy changes add to worries" - Adrienne Oliva. Judge's Comments: Very well-written piece. Captures the plight of DACA students.

Public Affairs Reporting Group A

First Place: MediaMilwaukee, "Generation Lockdown" - Staff. Judge's **Comments:** Taking an issue of national significance, examining its history, its effect on lives, using a current event with which to wrap it, brings it home to this entry's community through well-crafted on-scene reporting and visual support. Readers/viewers get a fully focused account via contemporary events and on-scene well-balanced reportage. This is not a gun-control story, but an evaluation of America's Second Amendment effect on society — the positives, as advocates maintain, and negatives as opponents perceive. A national issue localized.

Second Place: *MediaMilwaukee*, "*Exposing Sexual Harassment*" - Talis Shelbourne, Nyesha Stone, Miela Fetaw,

Jennifer Rick **Judge's Comments:** A generally thorough account of lingering and ongoing investigations related to the university's administering of and responding to sexual harassment and assault complaints involving faculty, staff and students. The focus of these stories further emphasizes the importance of reliable information imbedded in public records and their availability. An

admirable effort sourcing/resourcing, reporting and writing/recording about the issues disclosed here.

Third Place: The Badger Herald, "Executive order to end DACA leaves UW dreamers living in limbo" - Alice Vagun. Judge's Comments: Very good narrative exploring the effects of DACA's demise, though sourcing shows lawmakers aren't willing to abandon efforts to restore (as of

the article's publications date). Excellent work personifying an issue that is filled with personal experiences and challenges.

Honorable Mention: The Badger Herald, "UW students set their sights on local elections to bolster campus representation in city government" - Matt O'Connor. Judge's Comments: Nicely crafted essay on student candidates for civic positions beyond campus. The dialogue is excellent between the candidates. Even more striking is the historical perspective woven into this column. Excellent writing, with context, makes this an appealing story for readers.

Group B

First Place: Student Voice, "UWRF faces challenges of compression, inversion in professors' salaries" - Zach Dwyer. Judge's Comments: When you think of stagnant wages, professors don't immediately come to mind. But it affects them too. Good look at the topic, and solid graphics to go along with it.

Second Place: The Clarion, "Wolves Share: Team working on food insecurity issues brings resource fair to campus" - Andrew Kicmol. **Judge's Comments:** Great story on an awesome project.

Third Place: Stoutonia, "Voter Suppression Silences Students on Campus" - Elizabeth Vierkant. Judge's Comments: You buried the lede a bit in the second half of the second graph. Move that up and this is really solid work.

Second Place: The Clarion, "Active Shooter Situations" - Adrienne Oliva. Judge's Comments: Good work on an important, timely topic. Love the graphic element that draws your attention to the story and gives readers the most useful information up front.

Third Place: Stoutonia, "Behind the Scenes of Campus Parking" - Katie Schulzetenberg. Judge's Comments: Interesting look at a topic that is surely important to many students and relatable across many campuses.

First Place: MediaMilwaukee, "Barron, Wisconsin: An Immigration Story" - Madison Sepanik, Elizabeth Sloan. Judge's Comments: Fascinating. What a great look into this world. I felt like I had visited after reading the story.

Second Place: The Badger Herald, "Body hate and eating disorders, paired with pressures of campus, plague the minds of UW students" - Yusra Murad. Judge's Comments: Beautiful and brave story. Good for you to tackle such difficult topics.

Third Place: The Daily Cardinal, "How a 13-year-old Badgers superfan used Instagram to become 'part of the family" - Thomas Valtin-Erwin. Judge's Comments: What fun! Really enjoyed this story. Heartwarming and so sweet.

Honorable Mention: Advance-Titan, "We can do it" - Kierra Carr. Judge's Comments: I thought this was a great feature, good look into a community often overlooked.

influencer Amelia Skye tells her story" -Brooke Shepherd. **Judge's Comments:** The story has an engaging lede, an interesting person to profile, and is backed up with good sources to tie in with the story.


Second Place: Arches, "Trigger Warnings" - Quinn Clark. Judge's Comments: Interesting topic to explore backed by some facts on professors in the classroom and an expert to add context to the topic.

Third Place: Arches, "Too Black. Not Black Enough." - Termeria Taper. Judge's Comments: Good canvas of voices, including those who came from whitecentric areas and found challenges for not fitting into stereotypes created by other people.

Honorable Mention: Stoutonia, "A Walking, Talking, Photo Shooting Blue Devil History Book" - Logan Myhre. Judge's Comments: Great profile subject find, but the first two paragraphs seemed to repeat themselves. The rest flowed well. I encourage Logan to tighten up the writing and follow AP Style closer. First Place: Student Voice, "Rick Bowen court dedication reflects how far UWRF basketball has come" - Zach Dwyer.



Group B



Freedom of Information Award Group A/B

First Place: MediaMilwaukee, "Sexual harassment on campus" - Talis Shelbourne, Jennifer Rick, Nyesha Stone, Miela Fetaw, Elizabeth Sloan. Judge's Comments: An exceptional entry, but most important, an exceptional team effort to report with detail and attribution the human effect of harassment issues on this campus. The stories here are not composed with just the accounts delivered in public records, but the human impact of harassment on campus. It's reflective, the stories relate, on alleged administrative indifference to complaints with absence of resolution . . . both for victims and those accused.

And the "team" approach makes this a critical example of that tactic's success. Just excellent!

Second Place: The Badger Herald, "War of words: Proposed legislation reignites tensions on campus over free speech"
- Emily Hamer. Judge's Comments:
A terrific reporting and writing effort, tackling a "sensitive" First Amendment issue with a comprehensive analysis from campus to the halls of the state legislature. The story has exceptional balance; it does not focus on just the First Amendment challenge, but reflects on how free speech issues affect the campus environment, positives and negatives. Exceptional sourcing, too!

Third Place: Marquette Tribune, "MUPD uses undercover cops, K-9 units to investigate drug cases" - Sydney Czyzon. Judge's Comments: A very good story, using records and accountable live sources to examine what appears to be challenging drug-related issues on this campus, and how the campus police respond and investigate reported abuses. Well reported, well written.

Honorable Mention: The Badger Herald, "Instead of facing removal hearings for homophobic, anti-Semitic comments, Student Judiciary member quietly resigned" - Matt O'Connor. Judge's Comments: A good account, using records and direct human sourcing, to report on a challenging issue before the university's student Judiciary Committee. Records disclosed the issue, good reporting put it into "context" with those involved. Good reporting; good writing.

it up to the previous line with the other text – that will save space and look clean. I realize that's super picky, but sometimes attention to the smallest detail can make a difference.

Judge's Comments: I like the variety of items shown in the graphic and colors used. The breakdown by residence hall is quite interesting. Overall, nice and informative. As an outsider looking in, it took me a second to figure out what MUPD was - I think putting a title or heading over the entire graphic would have been helpful - something starting with "Marquette University's Police Department's investigation..." That would have spelled it out quickly for someone not acquainted with the area.

Third Place: Advance-Titan, "Department of Journalism Timeline" - Ana Maria Anstett. Judge's Comments: Nice, clean, simple timeline. I like the combination of photos and text.

Honorable Mention: Marquette Tribune, "Students launch blockchain

consulting firm" - Josh Anderson. Judge's Comments: A graphic is definitely useful in explaining blockchain. I had no idea what it was and coupled with the story, it makes more sense. Maybe adding one more section at the top just to give the definition of blockchain could have been useful. But very informative in a nice simple step-by-step design.

Group B

First Place: *The Clarion, "Hunger survey results"* - Alexandra Christensen. **Judge's Comments:** Love the blender and serving tray pie charts. Very creative.

Second Place: College Days, "March on!" - Cordell Walker, Mackenzie Dibelius. Judge's Comments: Good use of a timeline approach and lots of good information.

Third Place: Arches, "Let's Take a Walk" - Teresa Wooster. **Judge's Comments:** This is great stuff. Visually appealing but also very informative.

Honorable Mention: Arches, "The Persistence of Racial/Ethnic Stereotypes" - Payton Hintz. Judge's Comments: Good work. Love the different colored hands at the bottom. The word "lazy" definitely jumps out at you, which is an important part of the information being presented.


